Disability Day on the Hill

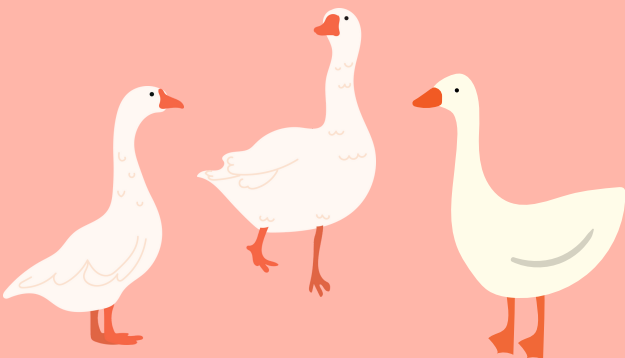

Independent Support Coordination/ECF Services

As an ISC you are faced with many situations, some of which actually require some crafty solutions, such as one I had recently. One of my clients had a problem with his feet slipping on his elliptical foot pedals. I was visiting with my client and noticed that his feet kept sliding off his foot pedals as his Occupational Therapist worked with him. I went over and began to suggest some ideas that may work for him to the OT. She said that she was very open to any ideas that may help this situation. I looked at the bottom of the machine and came up with an idea for a strap with a buckle to put around his foot. Well, the idea was good, but the strap kept slipping around the pedal as he would move his feet around and around. So, it was back to the drawing board! I went to Home Depot and found a mending plate that was close to the width of the machine. I met the OT over at the client's home and I screwed in the screws into the bottom of the machine. The problem was fixed! My client now has a working solution for his issue with his elliptical pedal machine.

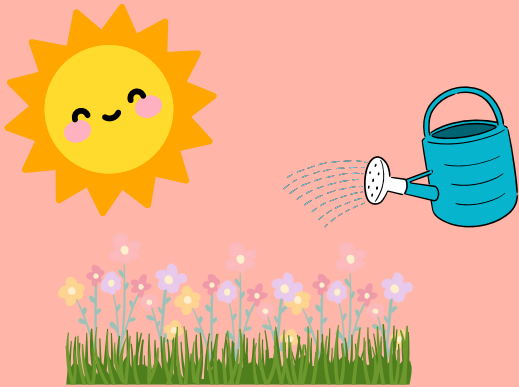

Employment Services

THE EMPLOYMENT SERVICES PROGRAM AT COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CENTER HAS BEEN GROWING!



The Employment Services department recently participated in the University of Tennessee Southern Special Education Program's FIRE (Fostering Inclusion through Resource Efforts) Resource Fair. This event connected local individuals, families, and educators to agencies and resources for individuals with disabilities. The Employment Services department was able to connect with several families and educators from Giles and Lawrence counties and discuss Pre-ETS. Several families expressed interest in receiving Pre-ETS summer services.

In the first 3 months of 2023, the Pre-Employment Transition Services program has expanded to serve three new schools: Marshall County High School, East Hickman High School, and Community Middle School. Pre-ETS is now serving 12 schools across 6 counties, with 85 students served in March!



Senior Equipment Loan

THEY HAVE ARRIVED!

The Senior Equipment Loan Program recently received a delivery of several items to add to its ever-growing inventory. Among these items included 3 wheelchair ramps, 8 shower benches, and 2 suitcase ramps! Thanks to funding from *Serving Tennessee's Seniors* - a grant administered by the Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee at the request of the Chancery Court - these new additions can now be offered to individuals in need of mobility assistance.
