

Children's Center for Autism

The Children's Center for Autism (CCA) is seeing many successes within our programs. Since our grand opening, held in February 2016, CCA has served 24 clients and a greater number of families who were looking for assistance in their communities. We made many changes throughout the year and have expanded our services. The expanded services include behavior consultation services for children ages 5-12, pre-enrollment services for children currently on the CCA waitlist, additional clinical therapy sessions in the afternoon, and adding TEIS vendor services for children in the birth to three population. We are pursuing credentialing for insurance with one of the TennCare providers as well as private insurance providers. The ability to bill insurance will greatly increase our ability to further our mission!

In our classroom, we have added sensory boxes, gross motor areas and a fun sensory wall (pictured below). These *Please Do Touch* items help integrate different stimuli, or "sensations," in our environment. Children on the Autism

Spectrum often have a sensory component to their personality, whereby some children need more sensory input and some need less and seek to avoid it. These additions to our classroom help our sensory seekers meet that need and our sensory avoiders learn to cope with different stimuli. This is an easy activity to incorporate in schools and homes. One of our local schools has modeled their sensory time after CCA's. We love sharing our ideas and knowledge with others who work with children on the Autism Spectrum!


